From the Rector

Dear People of Christ Church,

There has always been conversation in churches about having a newcomers' committee and how it should work. This is now seen to be too narrow a focus of responsibility as congregations have come to understand that welcoming must be done as a whole congregation, not by a small committee.

Over the summer, we at Christ Church are going to encourage the conversation with broader questions: How do we, as a congregation, welcome newcomers to make sure they are able to participate in our worship, be invited (by anyone at the service) for coffee hour, or helped to find where they need to go for anything from bathrooms to classrooms. Personal invitation and knowing someone is there to help are two of the best ways to make sure all have a positive and celebratory experience of worship and fellowship in the church.

A reason we need to do this is that there are assumptions we often make that lead us astray. Case in point: receiving communion. Any baptized Christian is welcome to come forward to receive communion. Those who are not baptized are welcome to come forward for a blessing. If people seem uncertain, please show them the instructions in the bulletin and invite them to come with you. They are also encouraged and welcome to talk to you or me about what Baptism means for us around communion and church life.

Another assumption is that people know how to receive Holy Communion. It's more complicated to someone unfamiliar than you might realize. In the Episcopal Church, people are invited to receive Holy Communion in "both kinds," which is a fancy way of saying both the bread and the wine. They do not have to, but they are welcome to if they wish. Wine can be received by sipping from the cup (with the recipient taking the base of the chalice to guide the cup to their mouth) or by intincting (dipping, please stand or have children stand if you cannot see in the cup).

Some recent questions have to do with people who cannot drink wine or have gluten. If you do not want to drink the wine, but wish to have some sacramental type contact with the wine, some options are: as the chalice is presented, simply touch the wafer to the outside of the chalice; or as the chalice is presented, hold the base while the chalicer says, "the blood of Christ, the cup of salvation," and then release the chalice; or cross your arms as the chalice goes by.

Gluten allergies are a reality in the community, and the gluten free wafers are brought by the clergy upon request. Some people have asked why the clergy hold the bowl out for the person to take the gluten free wafer rather than simply handing it to the person. It is simple – when the clergy are handing out wafers, we do not want the gluten on our hands to get on the gluten-free wafer. Some allergies are that sensitive, so we want to minimize risk.

So, we should not assume that everyone knows how we do things around Christ Church. There are also new realities in the community that we need to be aware of because we care about the people in and around our

parish. Hopefully, this makes you more aware so that, if you see a new face (they may or may not be new to the parish, but they are to you), and they seem uncertain about what to do at communion or at any other time before, during, or after the service, kindly ask if they have a question, or offer a gentle invitation to come up for communion *if they wish to*. Please do not assume people know what their options are.

Being a welcoming community to newcomers extends beyond a committee; the whole congregation must be engaged. It includes making sure people know to use our Book of Common Prayer, or our hymnal, or maybe pointing out the brochure in the pew which explains a good bit about the worship and the parish. Then, see if they want to join you to walk over to the parish hall after worship. This is not far off from how you would help greet friends and guests in your own home!

It is not a committee that welcomes, it is the parish. Thank you for your help in welcoming everyone to Christ Church – new people and people new to you alike.



The monthly service provides a relaxed and informal atmosphere with the repetitive structure favored by the attendees. Each service includes a lesson through a story or brief narration, prayers, the celebration of birthdays, and a sharing of the peace. The highlight for many is that the service is filled with singing and music, accompanied by guitar, piano or drums, and includes rhythm instruments for all the participants, resulting in a most joyful and expressive sound of togetherness.

This worship opportunity is constantly evolving in an effort to meet our goal of offering a service relevant to all people and realizing everyone's wishes for worship and fellowship. So, as part of our efforts to more accurately capture the diversity of talents and strengths of all who participate, our service will now be referred to as All Abilities Worship (formerly known as the Special Needs Service). Each month, we are making connections as we are focusing on gathering in a manner that celebrates each individual in attendance.

Finance News

Operating Budget Performance

Actual Still Better Than Plan – We're still riding the wave from pre-payment (at year-end 2017) of some 2018 pledge gifts, plus late 2017 pledge gifts received in January 2018. The budget for the first quarter of 2018 called for year-to-date revenues to fall short of expenses by about \$2,300. Actual performance has revenues exceeding expenses by about \$25,400. The detail table below shows actual in comparison to budget.

Last month total revenues exceeded total expenses by about \$37,700. The results for just the month of March, in the table below, show that our net position was budgeted to drop by about \$11,400 and actual performance had net position drop by \$11,300. This historical pattern of expenses exceeding revenues is expected and budgeted to continue through the summer and into late fall, until year-end giving finally pushes revenues in total to equal total expenses.

Sharing Meals in the Community

Last month, the Outreach Committee reported on the impact of the Christ Church Panda Pantry program, helping to feed so many children in our community. This month, we want to tell you about other outreach programs happening at Christ Church that also work to feed the hungry: Salvation Army dinners, Winchester Rescue Mission dinners, and that mysterious basket that gets carried up the main aisle every Sunday.

One night each month, members of the congregation on the Salvation Army Dinner Team, shop, prepare, and serve dinner to sometimes as many as fifty hungry people, including some children, at the Salvation Army's Ft. Collier Campus in Winchester. In addition to cooking and serving, volunteers also have the chance to sit and visit with those enjoying the meal. The dinner provides a needed break to the Salvation Army staff and a chance for the residents at the Salvation Army to meet some of our parishioners and to know



that the world at large also cares for them. Other area churches also participate in this long-time program.

While many parishioners support the Salvation Army directly, the meal program relies on donations made via the Salvation Army Dinners envelopes in the pews. Please be generous in supporting this outreach program.

And across town, one evening each month, volunteers from the Christ Church Men's Fellowship take the time to shop for, prepare, and serve a balanced meal for men, women and children at the Winchester Rescue Mission. This is a fairly new ministry and if you are interested in volunteering, please email Pat Kofalt (patkofalt@gmail.com).

And, that basket... the Salvation Army Food Pantry is the regular recipient of the canned goods in the large basket presented at the altar each Sunday during services. Your generosity and hands-on support of this ministry are so important and greatly appreciated. Please always feel welcome to bring non-perishable donations on Sundays for the basket.

These are just a few of our outreach ministries where active parishioner involvement is essential! All this we do to honor our Lord and Savior, and to care for the needs of those among us. Parish Nurse Musings

Spring is here, well maybe! One minute we are in shorts and the next we are in snow pants. That makes it difficult for our body to adjust. You will need to help it. Drink plenty of water to keep yourself hydrated. Stay away from soft drinks if possible. They can pull water out of the system or because you are drinking them you will not drink as much water as you should. Feel free to blow your nose when you come in from outside. Also pulling water into your nose can help clear out the pollen. Wet a clean wash cloth and sniff water up your nose and then blow gently to get rid of the pollen. Remember to walk after a rain when the pollen is less. Using a Neti Pot works well also. When the weather forecast says high pollen count



plan to do your indoor chores. Use allergy medications sparingly and if it gets very bad see a physician for prescriptions. Don't keep old prescriptions around. Use them and then discard them. Have a wonderful spring! See you in church!
